

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
WHY DID YOU BECOME A MEMBER OF EAG?

When I lived and worked in Manhattan, I'd certainly heard about the EAG, but I really knew very little with respect to what went on there.

Recently, when I was able to return to the area from the southwest, **Anthony Newfield** called and said I should join the EAG. (I had the pleasure of working with Tony for several summers at the Forestburgh Playhouse in the Catskills.)

He offered an astonishing rundown of what the EAG represents and what it contributes to the community: from providing emergency aid to offering member classes; from having an amazing history to making today's history; from encouraging identity awareness to producing original scripts. WOW! Count me in.

I've had such good years since I joined, and I've learned a lot from members who have been active and generous with their time for many seasons before me. I'm not as a rule sentimental, but I have to say that most of all — I've found a family.



My clearest early introduction to the Guild came from **Mart Hulswit**, EAG's former Executive Director. I'd worked with him on *Guiding Light*. Mart put out an invitation to the EAG "community" to spend Passover Seder at the Guild. I jumped at the chance. My husband, being Jewish, loved that I embraced their traditions. That Seder was the biggest, most beautiful table I'd ever experienced. Then **Ieslie Shreve** encouraged me to become a Life Member. At the time, I was working and had the extra bucks so I decided to use some of them to support Mart and all he did for the Guild.

Over time and my involvement as Chair for The Rehearsal Club, (TRC) I realized how intrinsically entwined the two organizations were in their history. The late **Arthur Anderson** and **Alice Middleton Anderson** were active members of EAG—and Alice had lived at TRC. I learned that the Deaconess of The Guild (formerly under a different name) had been the "guiding light" for the creation of TRC. How could I NOT get more involved! Whenever TRC created an event, we gave a platform for The Guild to share what they do—because of everything EAG continues to do for our theatrical community.



I got a lot more from the Episcopal Actors' Guild than I ever anticipated, and I continue to benefit. My first awareness was when I ran into an actor colleague who was also an EAG member (Laura Fay Lewis) at a nearby restaurant. She had just completed a show, singing at EAG. I asked how rock and roll related to being an Episcopalian. It didn't, nor needed to, as I would find out.

I soon became a member, intrigued by the EAG mission to help the acting community with many services. I joined the Finance Committee and attended group meetings and classes, like The Artist's Way and Actors Night, making many more friends and nurturing my interests. I then put on a onehour virtual variety show, Judging People Unfairly, co-hosted by my daughter Kelly Sisco and starring more than twenty-five participants. It covered scenes, songs, prayers, and stories about DEI (diversity, equity, and inclusion) and prejudice. That led to more personal growth for myself, and awareness of the importance of DEI in particular. Participating in the DEI talks, "Sustainable Conversations" led to my writing an original play called It's an Italian Thing! No. It's a Black Thing, and I performed a scene from my autobiographical play Once a Boy that deals with gender transitioning and enhanced self-expression for 2023's Small Plates.

I've met many wonderful people, some of whom will be friends for a lifetime.

In the 1960s I was working on Broadway in *Fiddler on the Roof.* Somehow, I got an audition for **Ray Heatherton**, who was, I think, President of EAG. The audition was to work in PROJECT R.E.A.C.H. (Regional Educational Advancement of Cultural Horizons), a federal program under the Nixon administration that sent professional actors and musicians into public schools.

That's when I met and worked with Lon Clark. Lon, Viki Vola, Trish Vandervere (who was married to George C. Scott), and I would get on a train early in the morning to go out to Long Island schools and perform for students. That was very early in the morning for me because I was working on Broadway and not getting to sleep until very late, since the shows then came down at 11pm. Lon would read the financial papers on our commute. He was the head of EAG for many years and managed its finances, and I believe, seriously increased its portfolio by his investments in the stock market.

It may have been **Mart Hulswit** who told me that Lon also volunteered to help actors who came into SAG [Relief Fund] in the hope of receiving assistance. And, one day, he excused himself to go into the hallway, take money out of his own wallet, and give it to an actor in need. That was Lon Clark, who had been a radio star back in the day, playing, among many other parts, the titular role in *The Shadow*.



This Year's Memorial Speaker, Anthony Newfield



The memorial service is a beautiful and powerful celebration of actors and actors' lives. I see it as a direct connection to Joseph Jefferson, George Holland, and Fr. Houghton.—Anthony Newfield



Anthony Newfield is an actor, director, writer, and book editor. Originally from Northern California, he graduated from the University of California, Berkeley (PBK), with a degree in Romance Languages. He studied at the American Conservatory Theatre in San Francisco and received his MFA in acting from Carnegie Mellon University in conjunction with the Moscow Art Theatre.

He spent six months in Russia, studying and playing Jim Casy in *The Grapes of Wrath*. His article about his time in Russia, "After the Orchard," was published in *American Theatre* magazine.

Newfield's Broadway credits: 1984, The Father, The Winslow Boy, The Columnist, The Royal Family, Waiting for Godot, Tartuffe. Off-Broadway credits: Ivanov (with Ethan Hawke and Joely Richardson), Susan and God, The Bad Infinity, Lady Windermere's Fan, etc. Regional theatre credits: Atticus Finch in To Kill a Mockingbird, Pride and Prejudice, An Enemy of the People, A Woman of No Importance, Orson's Shadow, Love's Labour's Lost, Arcadia, Les Liaisons Dangereuses, Bent (Carbonell Award, Best Supporting Actor), etc.

Theatres around the country where he's worked include Yale Rep, the Shakespeare Theatre of Washington, D.C., the Huntington (Boston), the Alliance (Atlanta), the Coconut Grove (Miami), TheatreWorks (Palo Alto), etc.

International credits: invited to Ireland, he played Ned Weeks in the Irish premiere of *The Normal Heart* in Dublin and on its Irish National Tour. He later played T. S. Eliot in *Tom and Viv* for the Rough Magic Theatre Company and appeared in Patrick Mason's production of *Peer Gynt* for the Gate Theatre, both in Dublin. In Tangier, Morocco, he was invited to play Giles Corey in a benefit reading of Arthur Miller's *The Crucible*, with Kenneth Branagh, Derek Jacobi, and Marisa Berenson, directed by Rob Ashford.

Television appearances include guest-starring roles on *Diagnosis Murder, All My Children, One Life to Live,* etc.; film work includes *I Melt with You* (with Rob Lowe and Jeremy Piven), *Diminished Chords, Miss Bertram's Awakening,* etc.

He is artistic director of Poetry for Peace and of I Fabbristi, the theatrical company of New York's landmark Edith Fabbri House / House of the Redeemer, for whom he has adapted and presented *The Iliad, Gilgamesh, Beowulf,* many play readings, and twenty-five years of Christmas programs. He has been a regular participant at the Steinbeck Institute in Monterey, California, and at the annual Steinbeck Festival at the National Steinbeck Center in Salinas, California.

Helping to develop playwright Richard Alleman's *The Bunner Sisters*, adapted from Edith Wharton's novella, he recently directed a reading of the Italian translation of the play in San Francisco, with an eye to a production in Pisa, Italy, next year.

He is president of the Episcopal Actors' Guild (EAG), a 501(c)(3) nonprofit providing emergency aid and support to professional performers of all faiths and none who are undergoing financial crises. The EAG is also dedicated to helping emerging artists advance their careers through scholarships, awards, and performance opportunities.

DIY with DEI Humanity | Chris Chinn

I cry a lot. Plays, movies, watching the clouds, a sunrise, seeing an elderly couple hold hands...I'm a crier. Tears don't scare me.

So I found myself sobbing on the 6 train in the Bronx the other day, returning from St. Raymond's Cemetery after scattering the last of Frankie's ashes among the graves of his sister Linda and father William. Now Frankie, too, will be forever in the Bronx. But I wasn't sobbing because of my sojourn to the Bronx--I was sobbing because I had just listened to a voicemail message left by a co-worker who I had not seen in nearly ten years. A beautiful, lovely, heartfelt message from someone who I do not even consider a close friend. He had no need to call me, except to let me know that he had only recently heard of Frankie's passing and was sending his deepest condolences. He could've texted me, emailed me, or commented on Facebook--he didn't have to call. I was touched by his humanity.

Humanity: the quality or condition of being human. Empathy; the ability to understand and share the feelings of another. These two words have been at the fore of my thoughts this past year. In my deepest most darkest hours, I have learned--and lived--what I have always believed to be true: the people who truly love you show up when you need them most. They show up!

I am so very lucky, so blessed to have so many dear, dear friends who have helped me navigate my way through my grief: My friends. My EAG "Ohana." So to hear from someone outside my circle--this former coworker who "showed up"--touched me greatly. And it has stayed with me. His kindness, his humanity, has burrowed its way deep into my heart, where it will remain. Amazing, isn't it? How much we affect one another? How a simple act of kindness or empathy or humanity stays with us? It is what EAG does, has done for 100 years, and continues to do.

The Archives | Eric Stamm

In response to being asked how I became part of the Guild, the answer is my early love of Old Time Radio. While administering the AIDS Initiative Program at The Actors' Fund, I found out that Lon Clark, who administered both the Guild and the SAG Relief Fund at the time, was a veteran of the Golden Age of Radio—the voice of Nick Carter, Detective. This led to Lon and me getting to know each other. At one point, having found out I owned a van, Lon asked me to help him transport trash from an apartment he was preparing for sale to the dump. While I agreed, I refused his offer to pay me. When he sent me a check anyway I made a donation to the Guild in the same amount and he made me a life member.

Within the year I was on Council and met a number of other Councilors who had worked in radio—stories galore! Turns out the Guild has a long relationship with radio. The first show I found documentation of in the Archives aired in 1927. Not bad considering commercial radio only began in November 1920.

Several of our Presidents had careers in radio—Staats Cotsworth comes to mind—and to date, I have located in the archive records of three radio shows the Guild was involved in. Most notable was *Great Scenes From Great Plays* which aired from 1948 to 1949. The Guild recruited actors for the show including Jane Cowl, Basil Rathbone, Celeste Holm, Walter Abel, Boris Karloff, Gene Tierney, Gertrude Lawrence, Raymond Massey, Henry Fonda, Walter Pidgeon, Jessica Tandy, Ingrid Bergman and Peggy Wood, among others.

In 2000 we gave the 16-inch transcriptions to the NYC Public Library and in return were provided with CD copies. So it was radio that brought me to the Guild, where radio has been a part of the history since its early years. Perhaps some night we can meet in Guild Hall and listen to some of these recordings.

Beyond the Fourth Wall | Mervyn Kaufman

I remember the occasion. My wife, Nancy, and I were invited to a holiday party hosted by an old friend. One of the actors there took a seat beside me, and we began to chat. Though I'd never been an actor, I explained, after a long career in book and magazine publishing, I'd recently ventured into playwriting.

"That's great!" he said. "Not so," I lamented. "By now I've developed a sizable body of work but have never seen any of my plays on its feet."

"So why don't you join EAG," he suggested. "Really?" I said, shaking my head. "I don't think I can qualify. I'm not an actor or an Episcopalian." "Not a problem—believe me," he insisted.

So a few days later, I decided to join the Guild and...well, just see what would happen. And something did happen, of course. I attended an event and fell in love with the place and the people I met there. I would learn very quickly that as a member, I'd become part of an irresistibly engaging non-judgmental community. When it was suggested that I help edit *The Eaglet*, I accepted the challenge readily. Time passed, and I later saw two of my one-acts included in evenings of *Small Plates* presented in Guild Hall. I felt really fulfilled!

Happy Anniversary to EAG and its diverse body of members. I am delighted to be part of its long and distinguished history.

Two on the Aisle | Jerry Vermilye

As assistant stage manager at the Berkshire Playhouse in Stockbridge, MA, in the mid-fifties, an aspiring young actor enjoyed the rare excitement of working with somewhat faded stars from Hollywood's Golden Age, as well as those who supported them.

With only a week to rehearse each play, most of those celebrities were hard-working pros. At 63, Ruth Chatterton would climb ladders and resurrect abandoned footlights with surprise-pink gels on dress rehearsal day. Richard Arlen welcomed a lobby display of vintage movie stills from his youth, but vinegary Sylvia Sidney evinced her displeasure with a fan's comment, "I'll never forget you in *An American Tragedy*," with the retort, "That was a very long time ago!"

Fussy Edward Everett Horton, a favorite of the matinee ladies, proved less lovable backstage, complaining loudly about his quick-change booth and relentlessly humiliating his leading lady in rehearsal. Margaret Hamilton, typecast by Hollywood in unpleasant film characters, displayed her naturally warm and kindly self, revealing her versatility. But Betty Field, cast as a grim and stoic character, allowed hovering playwright-husband Elmer Rice to offer counterproductive private direction that altered the play, resulting in a dress rehearsal that erupted into a war of words.
